WALT's award: 'What do you consider to be the benefits of ALIA membership for library technicians?'

The information revolution has well and truly arrived, in the midst of this revolution certain professions have developed to help bring some sort of order and control to this new age.

The development of these new professions has meant that new skills need to be developed, new roles identified and new organisations set up to help support and offer advice to these pioneering professionals. The Library Technician is one such profession that requires this support and ALIA is the organisation which provides it.

Today's technician is an integral part of many information agencies working in many varied environments. Professional recognition and acceptance helps give a positive self-image to the technician and a similar image to the public. ALIA is broad enough to represent many information personnel and has specifically designed a library technician's section resulting in many benefits for them. There are a number of areas in which ALIA membership specifically benefits library technicians.

Professional development:

Skills constantly need to be updated and new methods learned to help manage the growth and be an effective player in the industry. Membership to ALIA allows technicians to be aware of particular courses and further studies which may add value to professional development. Career development/opportunities:

ALIA, being the peak professional body in the industry of library and information, is highly regarded in terms of professional support and career development. Therefore, membership of ALIA allows library technicians to:

Understand the structure of the industry and therefore identify career opportunities relevant to the technician's personal needs.

Provide for connections and networks with employer groups.

Gain access to advice in career development activities.

These factors increase the library technicians opportunities for employment and ensures new developments are brought to the attention of its members.

ALIA also provides for the recognition of its membership which also enhances career prospects. ALIA has approved the addition of letters of affiliation (ALIATec) as part of a person's qualifications. This acts as a status symbol and gives recognition to those members who may be applicants for particular jobs.

Networking:

In today's interconnected society there is a need for all employees to be aware of and develop networks. A network of personal contacts of experienced people established in the industry and people of similar interests provides for a formal and informal way of receiving advice, giving advice, gaining understanding and keeping up to date. ALIA has institutionalised these networks allowing for members to communicate easily.

Social activities:
